The Passing of a Legend, Jack A. Baird

A tribute written by Jack's son Grahame Baird

Jack was born on 15th of June 1932, in Falkirk to his Scottish parents Alexander and Christine, who wished to call him John. However, a relative pointed out that Jack's Uncle John, who died on the Somme in 1916, was also born on 15th of June 1900. So, he was christened Jack.

anything else that came to hand at it! For their safety Jack and his Mother returned to Scotland.

After the war, Jack returned to England and his education at the Dartford Grammar school, where he excelled academically in science and sports, particularly cricket and football.

Jack was passionate about music. Having learnt to play Alto Sax, Clarinet and violin from the age of 4. He attended the London School of Dance Music part-time. He played in dance bands, primarily for "The Omegans" which his Father had set up and played in.

Post school education, Jack became an articled structural engineer with AE Watson, he progressed through his exams, each time delaying his entry into National Service. Eventually he became a Fellow of the Institute of Structural Engineers.

Following National Service, Jack joined GEC Simon Carvers, with whom he was part of the team who won the contract to design and build

Britain's 1st Atomic Energy Power Station.

Jack and his parents left Scotland and moved to Dartford in Kent when he was three. During WW2 he recalled a Messerschmitt 109 loosing off all guns over their house, trailing smoke before crash landing, and his Mother chasing a Dornier D17 down the road shouting and throwing bricks and

It was around 1957 that he and Margaret met. They married in 1958; Jack sold his saxophone to pay for the engagement ring! His son Grahame John arrived in 1962, and his daughter Joanne Caroline in 1965.

Jack's career path saw him work with Taylor Woodrow, before moving to a senior role with the Dexion Group. Dexion bought Newsum Timber Engineering, which in turn led to Jack being promoted in 1967 to the role of Technical Manager. This led to a move North to Gainsborough and buying a house in Lea where he lived for 50 years.

Around the early 1970s he was approached by The Swedish Trade Commission to work for them. However, rather than moving back to London, he "pioneered" home working, spending much of the working week in his home office in Lea and commuting to London for one or two days a week.

As the role with the Swedes expanded, the home office became too small, so Jack set up a satellite office in Retford.

A culmination of Jack's work with the Swedes, was being awarded the Order of the Polar Star in 1988 - the Swedish equivalent of a knighthood; the award was presented by the Swedish Ambassador, at the Swedish Embassy in London. A memorable moment for is family.

Jack wrote and had published 3 technical books - The Timber Designers Manual (1976), 2nd edition Timber Designers manual (1984) and Timbers Specifiers Guide (1990).

In his social life Jack played for his local cricket team, and golf at Thunnock Golf



CLAN BAIRD SOCIETY WORLDWIDE

FOUNDATION

This is the first in what will be a regular feature column in the Gryphon reporting on the activities of the CBSW Foundation

Let's begin with a bit of background. Byron O. and Frances Ellis Baird first had the idea of forming a Clan Baird Society during a visit to the Grandfather Mountain Highland Games (GMHG) in 1969. With the help of James Ian Baird, Viscount Stonehaven (later James Ian Baird Keith, Earl of Kintore), they petitioned the Lord Lyon for permission to organize an association that would honour the name of Baird.

The first organizational meeting of the Baird Family Society World-Wide was held during the GMHG in 1972. Articles of Incorporation were filed for Clan Baird Society Worldwide, Inc. in the State of Michigan on December 2, 2010. In 2013 we were granted status as an Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(7) corporation with the effective date retroactive to December 2, 2010. This status allows us to collect dues and donations for operational expenses

such as sponsoring tents at Highland Games and producing the Gryphon, but not to support the types of projects that will require investment in property or ongoing programs. For that we needed a separate organization.

Articles of Incorporation were filed for Clan Baird Society Worldwide Foundation, Inc. in the State of Alabama on April 28, 2020 and we were granted status as an Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3) corporation effective the same date.

This IRS designation allows us to raise funds for ongoing projects and makes donations tax deductible for US taxpayers. We are also investigating how members from outside the US can take advantage of tax incentives within your respective countries.

Although a separate organization incorporated in a different State, the Foundation will act as the fundraising arm of the Society. The Foundation does not have members as such, but is operated by a Board of Directors, the only requirement being that Directors be members of the Society. We have recently established a Foundation Fundraising Committee, which will begin meeting soon.

We have had a busy summer and fall, identifying 3 projects to get the ball rolling;
The St. Drostan's Project; the Baird Fire Scholarship; and the Clan Baird
Society Centre

The St. Drostan's Project is overseen by a Committee of the Society. We are extremely fortunate to have many of the Committee Members local to the Auld Kirk (St. Drostan's Church) with diverse expertise in the history of St. Drostan, the history of Auchmeddan, archaeology and local politics. We also have a volunteer legal advisor and a consultant for planning, marketing,



fundraising and the preparation of business plans. Since we have introduced the project in previous Gryphon's, I will not linger on the general topic here. The Aberdour Pals Subcommittee is identifying veterans who are buried on the grounds of the Auld Kirk and several other nearby sites within Auchmedden. The Subcommittee is compiling a list of grave sites that will be available later this year.

On November 11, 2020, called Veteran's Day in the US and Remembrance Day in the UK, we held the first of what will be an annual Remembrance Day Celebration honouring these veterans. Limitations on group gatherings made for a small ceremony this year, but in the future we hope to advertise a much larger celebration.

The Historical Subcommittee is busy producing content for a tri-fold brochure that will explain the history of St. Drostan and what we hope that the project can accomplish. Our Publicist, Heather Baird Snyder (Editor of the Gryphon and a professional graphic designer) will be producing graphics for the brochure, which will be used for marketing and fundraising.

Branton Baird, Foundation Secretary and Treasurer, is overseeing the Baird Fire Scholarship Program, which has already received funding donations for one US and one Scottish Student. Branton will be telling you more about this Project in future columns.

Our most ambitious project, is the Clan Baird Society Centre. It will be located close to the Auld Kirk in New Aberdour

We are still in the process of identifying a potential site, but that has not kept us from discussing and planning what functions it could include.

In future columns I will have much more to tell you about our ambitions for each of these projects, introduce the major players and what expertise each of them brings, and how we plan to plan to proceed.

For now, stay healthy and cross your fingers that we will be able to meet in Scotland this summer for the Annual General Meeting.

In attendance was Commander Richard Baird, accompanied by the Clan Baird piper, Adam and two representatives of Clan Baird, Corinne & Philip Cox. After placing small remembrance crosses at the foot of each headstone which commemorat-



ed the 20 members of the Armed Forces who lost their lives during the conflicts of WW1 and WW2, the group moved into the Baird Aisle and after placing a poppy

cross inscribed 'Lest We Forget', embellished with a Clan Baird ribbon, in the alcove memorial to James Baird of Auchmedden, our Commander began the traditional remembrance service.

"Today we remember the Fallen of both World Wars who are buried or commemorated here in the Auld Kirkyard of St.Drostan, in the ancient land of the Bairds, Auchmedden."

Following a reading of the poem 'In Flanders Field' by Corinne, the Commander read out the roll call of 20 names and there followed a 2 minute silence which ended with the Commander blowing his whistle.....a very evocative moment in keeping with the Somme-like weather conditions of the day. Following the Kohima tribute, the piper played, the moving sounds echoing over the kirkyard as a fitting memorial to the lost lives.



The Aberdour Pals project is currently researching the lives of those commemorated in the kirkyard and hoping to make links with the families who may still be living in the area to share in a perpetual remembrance.

"As long's there's an eagle in Pennan, There will be a Baird in Auchmedden."

This prophecy was said to be made by Thomas the Rhymer. Sir Thomas de Ercildoun, better remembered as Thomas the Rhymer (c.1220 - 1298) was a Scottish laird and reputed prophet from Earlston (then called "Erceldoune") in the Scottish Borders. He was said to be a wise and learned man, bard and friend to Alexander III (King of Scots 1249 - 1286) who wrote much poetry and made many notable prophecies.

According to Elizabeth Burton, the author of "The Life and Times of Thomas of Ercildune (The Rhymer)" there are five manuscripts which contain the prophecies of Thomas the Rhymer, the earliest written in the 15th century, all of which are included in her book. She adds that "the prophecy regarding the eagles would appear to have been recorded in local documents of the time and attributed to Thomas; so in that respect, you can quote it with authority."

A remarkable prophecy, considering Thomas lived in the 13th century and although the Baird family was around at that time. Auchmedden did not come into the Baird family until it was bought by Andrew Baird on the 10th November 1534.

The following two paragraphs are taken from "On the Bairds of Auchmedden and Strichen" by J. Malcolm Bulloch.

William Baird (1701 -75) VII of Auchmedden, the historian of the family, in his account of Aberdour, written in 1724, had said: "It is pretty remarkable that there is an eagle's nest upon the high rocks at Pennan where Auchmedden's milnstone quarry is. The pair who breed there have continued in that place, time out of mind, and send away their young ones every year, so that there is never more stays but the old

According to Pratt's "Buchan" (1858, ed., p. 181), the Bairds were "not free from the thral-

dom of this legend." Believing that the fortunes of the family were in some inevitable way connected with the presence of these eagles, "they sedulously protected them, and had them regularly fed by causing a daily supply of food to be placed on the ledge of the rocks." The story then goes on to tell that when the estate was sold in 1750 to the 2nd Earl of Aberdeen, the birds disappeared. But they returned in 1782 when Lord Haddo took his Baird bride there. According to the new "Statistical Account" (1843) the eagles remained in the rocks until the estate passed into the hands of the Hon. William Gordon. When William Gordon got Auchmedden the eagles again fled, and "have never (1843) since been seen in the country. These facts," continued the "Statistical Account," "marvellous as they may appear, are attested by a crowd of living witnesses." The same story is also told in the "Antiquities of Aberdeen and Banff," which was also

published in 1843. The eagles did not return to Pennan until Robert Baird of the Gartsherrie family bought Auchmedden in 1854, when, as the minister of Aberdour told Pratt in 1856, "one of the eagles returned to the rocks. But this, the men of the Coastguard, either ignorant of the singular history connected with the return of the birds, or indifferent to the romance of the story, pursued from crag to crag with their guns, till they either killed or dislodged it."

So, there seems to be a very credible link between the Baird family and the eagles of Pennan Head. **But which eagle?**

During the times in question, Scotland was home to very healthy numbers of both Golden and White-tailed Eagles; in fact up until the early nineteenth century when persecution resulted in the loss of many western European populations.

The more famous Golden Eagle, the national bird of Scotland, has maintained a presence, albeit much reduced, throughout the years. It is named for the golden-brown feathers on the back of its neck, head and upper wings; the rest of its body is dark brown. It is a skilled hunter, but not particularly choosy about what it eats. Grouse and other mountain birds, hares, rabbits and snakes are all on the menu, and it will eat carrion (dead animals).

The White-tailed, or Sea Eagle, while having a similar population in the eighteenth and early nineteenth century, was wiped out in Scotland, with the last British White-tailed Eagle being shot in Shetland in 1918. It has a dark brown body, brown and white streaked head, neck and breast and a distinctive white tail. White-tailed eagles are also versatile and opportunistic hunters and carrion feeders, sometimes pirating food from other birds and even otters. They eat largely fish, but also take various birds, rabbits and hares.

Starting in 1975 the White-tailed eagle has been systematically re-introduced into Scotland and in the words of Bob Watson "I believe that a pair or a couple of pairs are now nesting on the East coast, which could lead to them moving up to the cliffs of Pennan near New Aberdour in time, thereby fulfilling the Baird prophecy" (if the Clan Baird re-establishes itself in this area through the project we are working on).

Although both are large, the White-tailed is the larger bird with an impressive wingspan of 8 feet, compared to 7 feet for the Golden.

One of the concerns with eagles is their effect on sheep and lambing. An article published by the Scottish Ornithologists Club in 1985 (Golden Eagles and lambs in Badenoch, Highland, by D. N Weir) gives evidence of eagles also eating lambs. A report a few years ago looking into White-tailed Eagles and crofting found that less than 2% of lamb deaths on the west coast of Scotland were due to White-tailed Eagles, so the impact there is minimal.

So which of these magnificent species were our Auchmedden eagles?

William Baird's accounts just talk about the generic "eagle", but based on the eating habits of both and the "Sea" eagle's propensity for the coast, it seems more likely to be White-tailed eagles." In John A. Love's book "A Saga of Sea Eagles" he talks of White-tailed Eagle nesting sites - "Several other potential sites have now come to light. Formerly, eyries were known to have been located on Troup Head and on Pennan Head on the south coast of the Moray Firth, both notable seabird colonies today." Both Troup

Head and Pennan Head are adjacent to, if not part of the original Auchmedden lands.

Also, when asked the question about the Pennan Head birds, following a query to the Scottish Ornithologists Club, Dr. Alan Knox, Emeritus Head of Museums, University of Aberdeen stated "Traditionally, this was taken to have been a Whitetailed (Sea) Eagle, although it's been a long time since an eagle has nested on the coasts of Aberdeenshire!" He also stated that "White-tailed Eagles often nest on the coasts; Golden Eagles would be less likely."

Coupling this further quote from John A Love's writings - "White-tailed Eagles are much more approachable, and more tolerant of human presence, than Golden Eagles,..." - with the quote from Pratt's Buchan, it would seem more likely that White-tailed eagles would better tolerate having "a daily supply of food to be placed on the ledge of the rocks."

So there you have it. Regardless of which of these majestic birds it was, we can be proud that the Baird family has an association with either. Interestingly, the popular description of a Gryphon is - a composite mythological creature with a lion's body

(winged or wingless) and a bird's head, usually that of an eagle.

Coincidence??

1972 - 2022 | 50th ANNIVERSARY

- 1957 Rosalie Rountree, Georgia Capshaw and Ben Capshaw Jr. visit Rickarton for a few days, as guests of Lord James Ian Baird, Viscount Stonehaven, then Earl of Kintore and his wife Lady Kintore. Discussions of a Clan or Family Baird organization began.
- **1960's** Frances and Byron Owsley Baird were interested in beginning a Baird Family Society and talked with Lord Kintore more. He began to discuss the possibility with The Lord Lyon, King of Arms.
- **1970** Permission was given from the then Lord Lyon and with the help of Lord Kintore, the Americans started planning, contacting Bairds they knew, and writing up By-Laws.
- 1972 The Baird Family Society Worldwide was established formally at Grandfather Mountain Highland Games in July. Byron Owsley Baird was named Convenor and Lord James Ian Baird Keith, Earl of Kintore was named Patron. Dues were \$15.00 for an individual and \$20.00 for a family. The Gryphon newsletter was published twice a year.
- **1975** "The Bairds of Auchmedden March" written by Pipe Major Albert Richardson of Moffat for the Society, at the request of the Earl of Kintore.
- 1977 Spring trip to Scotland for the International Gathering of the Clans, and visiting Rickarton once again as well as visiting with Sir David of Newbyth in Edinburgh. The estate of Newbyth was lately sold to be made into flats. Lord Kintore invited us to Keith Hall, and many days were spent there, meeting and celebrating Bairds. Bryon Owsley Baird died in July, and Frances took over as Convenor.
- 1978 The stone from Auchmedden that Lord Kintore acquired, to be placed in the Memorial Carin at Grandfather Mountain, was given to the leaders there. Bryon Baird brought the stone back from Scotland in May 1977.
- **1979** July Gathering of Baird in Nova Scotia. Page Baird of Truro welcomed all to the International Gathering of Scottish Clans Nova Scotia. Lord and Lady Kintore were Honored Guests at the Stone Mountain Highland Games.
- 1981 International Gathering of Clans in Scotland. Special events planned for the Bairds by Harriet Roberts, our Tour Director. Georgia Capshaw designed and put into needlepoint, a Baird Crest Flag for use at festivals.
- 1982 International Gathering of the Clans in the USA for the first time. It was held at the Stone Mountain Highland Games in October. Our patrons, Lord and Lady Kintore were in attendance for the Bairds and the Keiths, as special guests of the games.
- 1983 Atlantic Canada members form Baird Family of Atlantic Canada Branch organization.
- 1984 The Bairds were one of the honored clans in a special section of the Grandfather Mountain program, called CLAN SCAN.
- 1986 The Council of Scottish Clans and Associations (COSCA) received word that they would be the named organization to disseminate any information to the USA, emanating from the Lord Lyon, King of Arms in Scotland.
- 1988 The Centenary of the birth of John Logie Baird was the theme of the year for the Society.
- **1989** The Society expands by setting up regions within the US and in Scotland, England, and Canada. Word of the death of the Earl of Kintore arrived and the Baird and Keith Clans mourned for the year.
- 1990 Dr. Kenneth Baird of Edinburgh University visited the US and suggested a Baird Gathering in Scotland, maybe at the University. Donald Erskine, who always claimed that he was a Baird, and his Catherine, were honored guests at Grandfather Mountain Highland Games. Donald was a vice president of the National Trust of Scotland.
- 1991 The John Logie Baird Foundation was established at the University of Strathclyde.
- 1992 Georgia Capshaw, Page Baird, Ken Baird, Dale Baird, and Donald Baird attended the annual meeting at Grandfather. They were all commissioners, as was Jack Baird in England, and Ross Baird in Scotland.
- **1993** The Baird Archives were presented to the Odom Library and at the 1993 Annual Meeting at Stone Mountain Highland Games, the name of the organization was changed to Clan Baird Society Worldwide, as of January 1994.
- 1994 The name of the Society changed to Clan Baird Society Worldwide. Jack A. Baird, Commissioner in England, and Dale Baird, President of the Society, went to Auchmedden and were welcomed by Mr. Duncan, the Mains of Auchmedden Farm manager. Jack and Dale found the foundation stones of the old Manse House/Castle.

Our farm has been in the family for nearly 100 years. Jenna and her partner Jacob are the fourth generation in our family to be sugaring on our property.

In January of 2017 they officially took over the maple syrup retail operation while still working for Bob (Jenna's father) producing the maple syrup.

Our 560-acre farm is located in Chittenden, Vermont and has been in the Baird family for four generations. Bonnie and Robert Baird own and operate the farm



today while their daughter Jenna and her partner Jacob run the maple syrup retail business.

Robert's grandparents, Sara and Ralph Baird, both grew up on farms on the road. In 1918 they purchased our farm from Sara's sister and brother-in-law. Their son Richard took over the operation in the 1940s and ran the farm until 1979 when Bonnie and Robert purchased the property.



Maple syrup was produced here even before the Bairds moved to the property. When Sara and Ralph began farming they milked cows and made butter that was sold door-to-door in the nearby town of Rutland. As the dairy herd grew, milk was sold into the Boston market and later to our local Cabot cheese plant. The milking cows were sold in 1996 and, since that time, maple syrup has been the primary crop on the farm.
