Summer 2022

Clan Baird Society is the oldest and largest Baird organization in the world. *2022 is our Jubilee year, celebrating 50th year in existence.* In the late 1950's, Commmander Richard Baird's grandfather, James Ian Baird, Viscount Stonehaven (Later Lord James Ian Keith, Earl of Kintore and Chief of the Keiths), invited Georgia Capshaw, Rosalie Rountree, Bryon and Frances Baird to his home of Rickarton. Here they spent many days discussing and planning the Society that would bring all Bairds back together.

As part of these discussions, Ben Capshaw remembers sitting on the patio at the back of Rickarton House and watching Viscount Stonehaven walk back up the hill with his fishing gear. Ben asked if the fish were were biting, and the Viscount told him that not for him, only the midges. Ben was about eight-years-of-age at the time and appreciated how kindly and respectfully he was treated by Lord Stonehaven, as if he were a man grown. That Baird personality carried the Society into existence and success.

After the meetings at Rickarton, Viscount Stonehaven talked with the then Lord Lyon about founding a Baird Clan Society; permission was given, and serious planning began. In 1965, Viscount and Lady Stonehaven visited the Rountrees and Capshaws in Mississippi and Louisiana, and later during that visit, all the families visited Dr. V.C. and Mrs. Baird in Houston, Texas, to discuss even more about how to officially begin the Society. The meetings were chronicled in the Houston Post.

By 1972, their work produced the Baird Family Society, which was formally established at the Grandfather Mountain Festival that July.

The Clan Baird Society Worldwide was born and nurtured by each of these founders until their deaths. Then, their families continued the tradition. The Capshaw children remain active members, as well as Lady Diana Holman, nee Baird, the daughter of the Earl, and her husband John, along with her younger brother, The Honourable-

Alexander David Baird. Our Commander Richard, the son of Lady Diana, continues this tradition of leadership, and is helping us grow as we never have before. We have the most members in our history now, with Richard's very timely energy and enthusiasm.

When the Memorial Cairn was discussed and planned at Grandfather Mountain, the Viscount/Earl of Kintore obtained a large stone from the old Auchmedden Estate, which his family owned last, until 1925 (it had been reclaimed and purchased by his great-uncle Robert in 1853), and Byron Baird brought it home to be added to the Memorial Cairn at Grandfather Mountain. We will always be in their debt for managing to get this stone to North Carolina.

The Society is extremely happy to make history again, with our own Commander, Richard Baird, being the Chief of the Games at Grandfather Mountain for 2022, following the footsteps of his grandfather and his Uncle Michael, both of whom served in this role during

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How Y-DNA Testing Helps Us All

As a basic understanding, Y-DNA is passed down along our paternal lineages, in an unbroken chain from father to son. Only males can carry Y-DNA, as possessing the Y chromosome is what makes men male. We test our Y-DNA at FTDNA (FamilyTreeDNA) and, at present, have the option to choose between three products, the Y-37, the Y-111, and the Big Y-700. The difference of these tests is the number of markers being tested: 37, 111, 700. Personally, I recommend the Y-111 marker test, which affords us a simplistic measuring chart on the FTDNA website. Below is a partial crop of a larger chart by FTDNA for Y-111 markers.

When your test results arrive, you are assigned a haplogroup and presented with a list of DNA matches. Yes, you can obtain your basic haplogroup from 23&Me, however, it is only a basic haplogroup and there is no marker information presented for you to work with.

What is a haplogroup? Think of it like your surname which you can trace back in time, and every so often the spelling of that surname will change slightly, giving us a different version of our surname. Like our surnames, we can often see where the spelling variations occurred, examples being: spelling changes upon immigration, language barriers, etc.. Upon that event, all the following descendants

of that particular branch present that spelling variation. And it is the same with the haplogroup on the scientific World Tree. We have the haplogroup and its descendants, called subclades. Think of these subclades like the spelling variations of your surname. Imagine a father and his many sons, then his grandsons and great-grandsons spread out into the world, carrying his surname and occasionally that surname having a variation.

You will notice that your haplogroup is subject to change as you upgrade from the basic haplogroup on 23&Me or the 37 marker test, to the 111, and then finally to the Big Y-700. Why is this? Think of it like a phone number. The basic marker tests are like an area code. The 111 marker test gives you the area code and the first three digits, so you can get a really good idea of where you connect. The Big Y-700 marker test gives you the whole phone number and dials you in directly to the information you seek. But remember, as with any DNA test, it's highly subjective to having DNA matches. So understand that if your direct paternal ancestry is deeply established in the Western World, you will likely have more cousins, close and distant, versus if your direct paternal ancestry quickly goes back to an area less established with records. For example, surname Baird. We have many branches established well into the 1600s and earlier, which includes paper trails and lots of descendants across the globe: America, Canada, Scotland, England, New Zealand, Australia, Africa, etc., etc.. You're going to have matches. Verses my own direct paternal ancestry, my father's line being in America for two generations before going back to a village in Hungary where they lived fairly isolated as far back as the 1200s. We have one

Y-700 match that is a 10 Genetic Distance and we would have shared a common ancestor about 30+ generations apart, being roughly my 15th-20th Great-Grandfather. Our paper trail in that region ends with my 5th Great-Grandfather, so that's a lot of gaps to fill, unlike our Baird example.

Here's where it gets fun! Among the Y-DNA matches you receive, you will be shown the Genetic Distance you share with each match. On the chart above you can see how each Genetic Distance is interpreted. Each measured Genetic Distance grants a confidence percentage of how many generations are estimated between you and that match. Example: 0 Genetic Distance has at 95% confidence to be 5 generations apart. We can go up 1, 2, to a grandfather perhaps, then come back down, 3, 4, 5 to a 2nd cousin once removed. This confidence percentage is "number of generations or less." Understand that this is an approximate, so 0 Genetic Distance could be father/son, grandfather/grandson, great uncle, 2nd great-uncle. We should see the common paternal line ancestor at or within three generations back, approximately. We couple this with traditional paper trail genealogy and have absolute confirmation of our ancestry. You follow this same process at each Genetic Distance.

So how does this help us all? Again, take the surname Baird as an example, with many branches and lots of brick walls. But, there are also many that do not have brick walls. We establish through paper trail the lines we can, then employ Y-DNA at the Y-111, and if needed, the Big Y-700. Soon we can begin to see the larger picture. We might not be able to find every generation between you and a DNA match, but we can dial you into your deep history and where you should connect.

Woodrow Allen "Woody" Williams

December 12, 1943 -
February 15, 2022

Woodrow Allen Williams was a native of Jackson, Mississippi, but spent most of his adult life in Huntsville, Alabama, working for the US Space and Rocket Program and the US Army. He attended Auburn University and studied Electrical/Electronic Engineering. He also attended Elmore County High School prior to university study, where he

graduated in 1962. He continued working for the Class as the historian, photographer, and communications chair, until his death. Woody was busy all the time. He served Clan Keith Society USA, currently as Vice President and over time in differing positions on the Board of Directors, including Assistant Convener and Editor/Photographer for the Keith & Kin Newsletter. He also served various positions with Clan Gunn

and with Clan Baird Society Worldwide, as well as a Board Member for Tennessee Valley Scottish Society. Woody was very proudly a Fellow of the Society of Scottish Antiquaries and could use "FSA Scot" as a post-nominal.

When not doing work with the Scottish world, Woody was busy in his engineering profession, although he was long retired. He was a member of the Huntsville Education Committee of the IEEE, as well as a life senior member. He was active with the International Society of Automation (ISA), the ISA North Alabama Education Chair and Historian, was Vice Chair and Photographer of the STEDTRAIN K-12 Grants and was looking forward to their activities this spring. His work with the K-12 children in math and sciences was legendary; he so enjoyed working with young and rising scientists. Woody was also active with the Alabama Solar Association.

Clan Baird Society will miss Woody's loyal friendship, great energy, and enthusiasm. It was hard to be negative in his presence; he would always see a way for us to do all we wanted to accomplish, and do it with style. He was helping us plan our 50th anniversary

celebrations for Grandfather Mountain Highland Games and working with Clan Keith Society to plan their activities there this year. We hope to celebrate him in a special way in our tents at Grandfather in July, giving tribute to this great man and his legacy.

The NaeSmyth legacy of Dawyck Botanic Garden

In Scotland, there lies a beautiful garden full of many varieties of plants, flowers and trees. The gardens of Dawyck were the brainchild of the

Veicht family. In the 17th century, they planned out how large the garden would be and enclosed it in order to protect plant life from the grazing animals nearby. In 1650, they introduced the first exotic tree, the Horse Chestnut, into Scotland. The garden continued to grow with various plant life. In 1691, John Veitch was so deeply in debt that he had no choice but to sell the land. His cousin, James NaeSmyth, bought the land and continued planting more trees. On September 17th, 1703, parliament granted ratification

in favor of Mr. James (NaeSmyth) Naismith of Dawyck. The lands were officially his as well as the barony. His son, another James, would go on to study under famed botanist and zoologist Carl Linnaeus of Sweden. Through James' studies, he worked to greatly improve the gardens and become the second baron upon the death of his father. He worked closely with Linnaeus to lay out the plantations at Dawyck. The garden would later go on to be taken care of by his son, Sir James, 3rd baronet.

This James' son, Sir John Murray, 4th baronet, exceeded his grandfather's legacy. He supported the plant-hunting

expeditions being done by many plant hunters, but none more so than by explorer and plant hunter David Douglas. Thanks to their partnership, the variety of plants and flowers from all over the world greatly increased, adding more beauty to the garden.

The NaeSmyth family as a whole owned and preserved the gardens at Dawyck for just over 200 years. The Balfour family ended up acquiring the estate in 1897, before eventually donating



the estate in 1958 to the Royal Botanic Gardens of Edinburgh.

With a nearly 300 year history of being own by only 3 families, The Dawyck Botanic Garden became a national treasure. I am proud of the hard work my ancestors put into creating such a beautiful place. I can't wait until I can go and visit one day and stand in the gardens that my ancestors helped to create. I am so proud of their efforts to preserve such beauty and to allow those who live in Scotland to be able to see plants and trees from all over the world. Thank you Veitch, NaeSmyth, and Balfour family. Your legacies continue to live on!

In September 2021, as lockdown eased, I was finally able to make my way home to Scotland. My mission was to visit the old Auchmedden Estate in Aberdeenshire, since, according to family tradition, this is where my Bairds originate.

We stayed in Aberdeen and headed out to explore the north coast. It was a beautiful autumn day, round straw bales dotting golden sunbathed fields and buzzards circling overhead in a clear blue sky.

We started at Rosehearty and explored our way along the coast, ending up at Portknockie and the spectacular Bow and Fiddle Rock, visiting many fascinating places as we went, from the crum-



bling ruins of Pitsligo castle to the pretty harbour of Portsoy, stopping for lunch in Banff along the way. But here I will share with you only the section of coast that was once the Auchmedden Estate.

We started at the beach at New Aberdour, parking down on the shore. Here is St Drostan's Well, said to mark the spot where the St Columba and the first

missionaries landed to convert the heathen Picts of this region. From here we walked back up the road to the Auld Kirk to see where the Bairds are buried.

I was kindly shown around the Auld Kirk by Corrine Cox who told me about the history of the region. The monastery that had once been here and the Bairds themselves who had once worshiped in this place and were buried here, their memorial stones now sadly weathered by wind and rain. But the sense of the place was very powerful and Corrine brought it to life. I could imagine myself back there in those distant days.

It was strange to think that I was the first Baird in my line to walk in this place for hundreds of years, and with the unseasonably warm temperatures and fine weather the moment was magical.

From there we headed along to the village of Pennan. An incredibly pretty collection of white cottages nestled at the foot of the cliff.

I was familiar with it from the film Local Hero (Which I had watched again shortly before setting out on this trip) but until recently hadn't realised that it was once part of the Auchmedden Estate. We walked along the harbour wall and watched the waves splashing against the sea defences and I

couldn't help wondering what sort of a battering it must get when the winter storms come in.

Our final stop was the Mill of Nethermill. A great place to stop for a coffee and took a look at the bridge that once



joined the Baird and Gordon lands and marked the edge of the old Auchmedden Estate. We sat in the sunshine and stared out at the sea and I thought about the Bairds who had been forced to leave this beautiful place and how sad it must have been for them.

And then I also left, heading along the coast. But unlike my ancestors I will be retuning. Hopefully later this year, to show my own children the lands of the Bairds. And whatever the weather, (this is Scotland after all) I know it will be magical.
