Lord Lyon, Family Projects, Social Media Pilot, Global Expansion of the Society



Lord Lyon Sets Hearing for Chief Petition The Lyon Office Court

The official representative of the Crown for everything related to heraldry, announced that a hearing has been set of for the 7th September 2022, in Edinburgh, to review the petition of Sir James Baird Baronet of Saughtonhall, to matriculate the Undifferenced Arms of Name of Baird. Members of the public may observe but not participate, as Sir James will review his petition with the Lyon Court. This is groundbreaking news for all Bairds.

If the Lord Lyon accepts the petition, Sir James will become the Chief of the Name and Arms of Baird. In the eyes of the Lord Lyon, the Name of Baird will have Chief. This would also allow Sir James to sit on the Standing Council of Scottish Chiefs amongst the Chiefs of Highland Clans and Lowland families such as Clan MacLeod of Harris and House of Bruce¹.

With a favorable judgement, Sir James would be named Chief of the Bairds. Sir James will be the Chief of all Bairds but not of any Society or group which will retain independence. This would also represent the first time in the modern era that the Bairds would have a Chief

identified by the Lord Lyon. Sir James has worked for more than 25 years collecting all the documentation required which extends back to the 1500s which included completing the petition during the pandemic when resources were not readily available. His efforts represent one of the single greatest efforts in genealogy as he was required to show descent from each subsequent generation and show that he is the heir to Arms awarded to Sir James Baird of Auchmedden in 1672.

All Bairds are excited to see the results of the hearing of this historic occasion. For those interested in learning more about Heraldry, Lowland families, Highlands Clans and Chiefship, the Standing Council of Scottish Chiefs contains guidance to answer general questions.

When a decision is reached, the Society will send out a communication to all members to make all aware of the event.

Family Projects

To expand genealogical resources, and widen the tent for all Bairds, the Clan Baird Society Worldwide will develop family genealogical projects that will focus on Individual families.

These projects will be given space in the Gryphon, Society website, and on social media for project members to share, contribute, and learn about families in which they have an interest.

These will include prominent families in Scotland as well as the rest of the world. Project members will have the ability to request funding and promote research

for those family lines. Further information will be provided as we approach the pilot project kickoff in early July.

Social Media Pilot

Board members of have begun a new social media pilot to investigate Discord program. Discord, similar to Microsoft Teams, or a cross between Facebook wall, Skype and Zoom allows members to interact with each other either via text or voice-based messages. It can be accessed via PC or mobile device, offering easy access from anywhere, at any time.

This type of software is used in the corporate world, to instantly message teams and improve productivity. The hope is to expand usage of the platform to engage all members and drive productivity. Global Expansion of the Society

The Society is moving closer to truly becoming worldwide and has established its headquarters permanently in Scotland. The Board reviewed and created a draft model of the Worldwide organization.

This will include the continued creation of independent Baird organizations representing different regions of the world. Membership in Clan Baird Society Worldwide will include free membership in any one regional organization, creating a seamless worldwide organization, rooted in Scotland, that has the flexibility to deal with specific regional interests.

More information will be communicated as the Society Board completes the necessary work.

Broadening Clan Baird Society, USA Board

Each year, the Board of Directors actively seeks to add talent to its rank to help serve the society. During this time, we also vote to retain members who continue to serve if no one is available to take their place. The goal of the Board is to reach a maturity level where members can rotate in and out to allow fresh ideas and perspectives. The question that often comes up is "how does an individual get on the Board of the Clan Baird Society?"




into family history research at the early age of nine, fortunate to have been mentored in traditional genealogical methodology from many elder cousins. I come to you with

over 25 years of experience. Having built my own family tree from breadcrumbs, it was not long before I began doing research for relatives and friends. I have worked with genetic genealogy since its inception to the consumer base. I have helped solve countless adoption cases and have served clients with a variety

of genealogical queries. I am currently pursuant of certifications with the National Institute of Genealogical Studies and seeking ICAPGen accreditation. I hold the honor of serving as genealogist for the Clan Baird Society Worldwide.

BAIRD: From Monmouth to Monkland, was inspired by the great lack of sources connecting my ancestor, John Baird of Monmouth, to his family in Scotland. Information circulating about Old John is often misinformation presented with little to no sourcing, abundant with errors. This work was written and compiled to provide a modern reference guide, as a testament to Old John, and his probable father, James Baird the Exile, providing sources and original text packaged together in one place. With full source citations and supportive genetic analysis presented in an easy-to-understand manner, readers are able to retrace my research journey and discover how I came to the conclusions outlined herein.







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As an introduction to myself, I should start with my first interaction with the Clan Baird Society Worldwide. At 15, I saw my first highland games. The games were so small and held on a small field. I remember looking at Clan row and sadly, not seeing any Beard/



Baird/Bard tent. I set out to find the clan. I met a wonderful gentleman from Aurora, Colorado named Dale F Baird, Sr., former president of the Society. He visited, we setup a tent, and he started me a long journey of being a state rep. A few years later, at 19, I was manning a tent alone when an elderly gentleman from Scotland entered my tent. He began to quiz me about Scotland, then about Clans, then about genealogy. I was no match for him. Mr. Moffat began to challenge me if the Bairds were even really a clan. Finally, as if out of a Stevenson novel, having failed to impress him with

genealogical, Scottish or Clan knowledge, he laughed at me and claimed, "I probably didn't know my father."

Thus began my quest to learn all that I could so the next time I met him; I would stand against him.

I learned to speak Gaelic. I studied Latin. I studied Scots. I learned to throw weight in the Highland games. I turned my attention to Baird history and Scottish history in my spare time on my way to get a biomedical engineering degree. All things Scottish and Baird became my passion. I have focused for years on uncovering and recording any historical evidence, however small, that we are a Scottish Clan. I have worked to document our true traditions, songs, crafts, and stories.

I now have adult children, but my passion hasn't wavered. But now, we focus on a different mission and goal. Our Society faces new challenges with growth and engagement. We are shifting into a digital age of social media, Zoom communication, and rapid modernization. We need to find way to engage these platforms and maintain our Scottish Baird culture where it can flourish. We need to learn how to connect as family and not merely allowing vitriol to overcome us.

With a background in Banking Risk and Governance, I will be focusing on ensuring the health and legal compliance of the Society. We will engage and provide membership value. We are going to focus on member engagement and getting people to volunteer to serve on the Board and a variety of committees so we can experience progress and growth. The old Kirk in Kincardine O'Neil contains an intriguing memorial. It reads as follows:

HERE LIE THE ASHES OF
CAREY HENRIETTA MORDAUNT BAIRD FRASER
CROIX DE GUERRE LEGION D'HONNEUR
YOUNGER DAUGHTER OF
MAJOR FRANCIS FRASER OF TORNAVEEN
AND WIDOW OF GEORGE BYNG MARSHALL
BORN 22-5-1896 DIED 22-8-1979

Carey Fraser was born on 22 May 1896. She was the youngest of the five children of Major Francis Fraser of Tornaveen and his wife Beatrice. She owed her name to a direct ancestor, Carey daughter of Sir Alexander Fraser of Durris, Court Physician to Charles II, who through her marriage to the eminent soldier and Third Earl of Peterborough, Charles Mordaunt, became Countess of Peterborough.

Carey's brother Lachlan and her elder sister Violet's husband, Archibald Robert-

son-Glasgow, are both commemorated on the Kincardine O'Neil war memorial. Lachlan died in February 1915, weeks after Archibald was killed in an unsuccessful raid on enemy trenches in November 1914.


In March 1918 Carey, who had been in France in August 1915 and possibly since, joined the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry (FANY), as an ambulance driver, carrying out, among other things, the very hazardous task of conveying wounded men from the front to hospital behind the lines. In July of the same year, she was caught up in an incident in which a torpedo struck in front of her vehicle and the orderly beside her was killed. Despite the fact that she herself sustained serious wounds in both the chest and the liver, Carey got herself to the nearby hospital to summon help. This, most unusually, earned her both the Légion d'Honneur - France's highest military honour - and the Croix de Guerre. She is thought to be the only British woman to be awarded both. Her citation reads:

Charged, on the night of 18 and 19 July with transporting the wounded, accomplished her mission under a violent bombardment, received in the course of the way two very serious injuries, her ambulance having been destroyed by an explosion, had the superb courage to walk the two hundred metres which separated her from the nearby hospital to notify the doctor on duty that she was bringing wounded to him. Having collapsed and transported herself to the hospital to be operated on there, she insistently demanded not to be cared for until after the wounded for whom she was responsible.

Carey's unit was disbanded in early 1919, but some drivers were given the opportunity to work as part of the post-war Civil Relief Scheme, and she became the head of a new Unit 9 based at Compiègne, where the FANY continued to exercise

their driving skills in assisting with the reconstruction of war-ravaged France. In 1921, Carey married George Byng Marshall at St George's, Hanover Square.

She later lived in Italy, and in the US for a time including during WW2. She had two daughters and died in 1979 at Rapallo on the Italian Riviera, near Genoa. She returned on occasional visits to Aberdeenshire, but never came back to live here. There must nevertheless have been more than a lingering attachment to the place of her childhood; Carey's address in Rapallo was "Villa Tornaveen", and she left instructions that her mortal remains should be brought back and buried in the old Kirk with her family.

Medieval Hip Hop Rap Battles: Flyting and The First Recorded Spelling of "Baird"

Over the last few decades, a fierce debate raged between Academics and amateur historians over the origin of the surname of Baird/Beard (and all other spelling variations). Belgian and Dutch academics point to potential Flemish origins of the name (Baarde) while Scottish Gaelic philologists direct attention to Gaelic origins (Fergus Mak Bàrd). William Baird, 7th Laird of Auchmedden, described Norman origins in Seigneur de Beart. More recent conjectures

Of Kilhenzie." However during the 16th century, the Modern spelling emerged. In Aberdeen, we see an entry for a local elected burgh official, Alexander Baird. Elected as a "Beer Taster", his fellow citizens elected him to the best sounding civic office possibly ever created. In reality, "Ale-tasters" or "Ale-Conners" had the miserable job of tasting bad Ale and then fining proprietors. This was not a highly desired office but the life of this Alexander is another article.

The shift in spelling in the 16th century occurs during what is termed as the great

from non-academics allude to the Northern English Barde as a potential origin. Primary sources add to the confusion as 12th and 13th century documentation, written in Latin, spells names to match medieval Latin orthography. An example of this is the double "AA" spelling to represent grave accented "A" as in Baard versus "Bàrd". The answer most likely is there are many origins of the name and but what we do know is when writers first spelled the name as Baird and Beard in Scotland.

Prior to the 1500s, documents spell the name as Barde. This can be seen in the "Barde (Baird) of Ordinhivas" and "Barde vowel shift. This was a linguistic revolution called the vowel pronunciation to shift in which vowels changed their sound and producing the modern pronunciation. Both Scots and English experienced this change and created new words such as the rise of the word "Laird" from "Lord". Baird also shifted during time from "Bard" to "Baird" in the literary sources.

Recently, the University of Glasgow and the Scottish government have documented early Scots language from original sources, and we can see the shift of Bard to Baird and Beard, These changes started in the 1400's and continued in to the late 1600's.

The earliest record of the spelling Baird in the Scots language is a fascinating piece of work from the lowlands of Scotland. Written in a late 15th century poem, The Flyting of Dunbar and Kennedy, Baird emerges for the first time in literacy sources.

The word Scots word Flyting, or Fliting, derives from Old English and Old Norse (Two linguistically related but similar languages) "Flitan" and "Flyta" respectively, meaning "To quarrel". This word passed in to medieval Scots as Flyting. Flyting, an ancient Scottish tradition, occurs when two poets trade insults in metrical rhythm and rhyme to both impress the crowd with the lyrical skills and present their opponent as having inferior skills. The poets, also called Makars(or Makers in Middle English), entertained crowds in a feasting halls by attempting to elevate their status above their opponents.

Recently, researchers have compared American cultural Hip Hop/Rap battles to our understanding the Scottish Flyting tradition. In addition to the trading of insults in rhymes and in metrical rhythm, Scottish makars retained a "commissary", or deputy, whose role was to support their poet and keep the crowd interested, similar to a "Hype man" in American Hip Hop. While insults ranged from clothing, to family, and even ethnic origins, participants brushed off the insults after engagement in both American and Scottish activities. In both cases, each side allowed the other side allotted uninterrupted time and could then respond during their turn. The winner, chosen by the crowd, would toast the loser afterward. In both cultural events, participants saw the trading of barbed insults as being just business. Coarser language was used, both modernly and in the Scottish flyting including the first accepted documentation of a particular four-letter word. Both would be viewed as an art form and as obscenity during and after their time. The similarities between to the two events is remarkable.

This brings us to the moment when William Dunbar, the East Lothian Makar, first used the term Baird in 1495. That year, Dunbar, from Edinburgh, confronted Walter Kennedy, a Gaelic speaker from Carrick, now South Ayrshire, in the court of James IV, the last Gaelic speaking King of Scotland. Both Makars, or poets, were considered poetical superstars, or celebrities, for their skill. This flyting or rap battle would have been cultural highlight of two lyrical giants squaring off. The modern equivalent might

be Snoop Dog and Enimem (or considering Scottish Rappers only, Griogair Labhruidh and McRoy) facing off in a rap battle at Windsor Castle for the Royal Family.

It is also interesting to note the Baird connection. Maybole, the capital of Carrick, is where the Baird's of Kilhenzie lived and their castle still exists to this day. Maybole was the also last place in Ayrshire, Galloway and the rest of the lowlands, to speak Gaelic until the mid-1700's. The Bairds of Kilhenzie were also vassals of the Earls of Cassillis, who were Kennedys and closely related to Walter Kennedy, the Scottish makar who participated in the flyting. 100 years later, the Bairds of Auchmedden in Aberdeenshire while in France would refer to the Earls of Cassillis as "my lord Earl of Cassillis" and seek to find connections to travel from France back to Scotland. In this way, this showdown was had both geographical and cultural implications as well as a connection to Baird history.

Dunbar began his attack on the office of the Gaelic bard and his superiority to Kennedy.

Bot wondir laith wer I to be ane baird, Flyting to use for gritly I eschame; For it is nowthir wynnyng nor rewaird Bot tinsale baith of honour and of fame, Incres of sorrow, sklander and evill name

Translation:

(But a distasteful wonder were I to be a Bard Flyting to use, greatly puts me to shame For it is neither winning nor reward But the loss of both honour and fame Increase of sorrow, slander, and evil name)

Kennedy retorted:

Pas to my commissare and be confest, Cour before him on kneis and come in will, And syne ger Stobo for thy lyf protest. Renounce thy rymis, bath ban and birn thy bill, Heve to the heuyn thy handis, ande hald the still. Do thou not thus, bogane, thou salbe brynt, With pik, fire, ter, gun puldre and lynt, On Arthuris Sete or on ane hyar hyll.

Translation:

Pass over to my crew and be confessed, cower before him on knees of free will, And then to Stobo, for your life, to beg and protest. Renounce your rhymes, and sign your recantation bill, Lift to heaven your hands and hold the documentation still.

If you don't do this, pimple, you will be lit, With pike, fire, tar, gun powder and flint, On Arthur's Seat or on a higher hill.

Dunbar continued in his next verse:

Iersche brybour baird, vyle beggar with thy brattis...

...Forworthin fule, of all the warld reffuse, Quhat ferly is, thocht thow rejoys to flyte? Sic eloquence as thay in Erschry use, In sic is sett thy thraward appetyte

Translation:

Gaelic wretched bard, beggar with your bratts....Forwithing fool, of all the world's refuse What wonder it is, you thought it joy to flyte Such eloquence as they in Gaelic use In such is set your perverse appetite

The terms lersche (Irish) refers to the Gaelic language after Scots supplanted it as a court language. The word, Scottis, originally signified Gaelic but changed meaning as lowland Scots replaced the lan-

guage. Over time, Gaelic was referred to as Erse or Irsche. Brattis refers to a type of loose cloth worn as a cloak around the shoulders much like a blanket. During this time, the Brat began to be buckled around the waist to form the great kilt. This word was used as a precursor of the great kilt which was beginning to appearing at this time. Dunbar uses several lines to refer to the "Highland Strain" of his Kennedy's tongue and accuses Kennedy of being an uncouth Gaelic speaker dressed in either highland clothing or the pan-Gaelic leine or shirt. Albrecht Durer's interpretation

of the Leine and Brat or woolen overcoat on Scottish mercenaries in Ireland from the Western isles in 1521.

Kennedy responded:

Thou lufis nane Irische, elf, I understand, Bot it suld be all trew Scottis mennis lede; It was the gud langage of this land, And Scota it causit to multiply and sprede Quhill Corspatrik, that we of tresoun rede, Thy fore fader, maid Irisch and Irisch men thin, Throu his tresoun broght Inglise rumplis in: Sa wald thy self, mycht thou to him succede.

You love no Gaelic, elf, I understand
But it should be all true Scotsmen's speech
it was the good language of this land
And Scotia (Scotia) caused it to multiply and reach
While Corspatrik that we, of treason, read
Your forefather, made the Gaelic
and Gaelic men thin
And through his treason brought
English rumps in
So yourself might, if you to him were to succeed

Kennedy connected Dunbar to a traitorous family from the days of Wallace and Bruce and then turned the accusation of being Gael to remind that once all Scots spoke Gaelic and that Dunbar's family had betrayed the country in its formative years. This was an epic battle the covered ethnic, cultural, historical and linguistic divides that exist to this day.

The poem grants us a rare insight into Gaelic and Lowland Scotland as well as the cultural exchange. We can see a snapshot, even if in satire, of society. Its connection to the Earl of Cassillis provides insight into the less studied Bairds of Kilhenzie and even the ancient Bairds of Auchmedden. A deeper history is shown. More importantly, we see the earliest spelling of the word Baird and watch its evolution of the word from Bard. It shows the origin of the current spelling and how pronunciation drove the spelling as much as familial bonds and establishes an origin points of sorts for Bairds, Beards, etc.

Dr. Wilson was a country boy, a teacher, a scholar, and foremost, a kind gentleman. He loved teaching in all forms and enjoyed hearing from former students as well as meeting new ones. His current position at Wallace State Community College, teaching people how to drive trucks for their CDL license, was one of his favorites. It gave him another chance to feel close to his father, a life-long teamster.

He is survived by his wife, Dr. Debra Baird of Haleyville, son Mr. Jammy Wilson of Huntsville, daughter Ms. Heather Wilson Campbell of Chattanooga, stepsons Mr. Seth Burgess of Memphis and Dr. Branton Baird of Haleyville, granddaughters Ms. Anna Ryan Burgess Ferguson of Troy, Misses Rowan and Lauren Burgess of Memphis, Miss Ivy Wilson of Huntsville, Mr. Ryan and Miss Jaynie Campbell of Chattanooga, Mr. John Hales of Chattanooga, and sister, Mrs. Kathy Wilson Giles, of Monroe, Georgia.

Dr. Wilson graduated from Dora High School as part of the class of 1972, then attended Athens State University, earning his bachelor's degree in education, University of West Alabama for his masters and The University of Alabama for his doctorate. He taught for several years in elementary and middle schools, and then at the college level. Before his teaching career, he owned A&J Freight Company in Chattanooga, and worked for Safety Clean Corporation as a District Manager.

Alton was a devoted father and grand-father, giving all to his children, rearing them as a single father at a time when that was extremely unusual. 


A Baird and NaeSmyth Union

Brandon Nesmith, Member for Family NaeSmyth, CBSW Committee

The union of the Baird and NaeSmyth families began in 1544, and would spawn a close kinship that would last for centuries.

The year was 1544. In Edinburgh, Scotland, two prominent families would join together in marriage to create an unbreakable familial bond. Elizabeth Baird, born sometime between 1523-1525 to John and Janet Baird of Posso, married Sir Michael NaeSmyth, born sometime between 1518-1525. Elizabeth's father died while she was still young. Elizabeth had one sister named Janet and an older




brother named Gilbert. John's property of Posso was passed down to his son. However, Gilbert died at an early age and the property was divided between his two sisters. Janet went on to sell her half, but Michael and Elizabeth, who married a few years after Gilbert's passing, would keep theirs until it was taken from them after Mary, Queen of Scots, lost at the battle of Langside, with Sir Michael fighting under her banner.

Even though this line of Baird became extinct, there were still other related Bairds in Scotland. The next time we see the Bairds and NaeSmyths together is in 1683 when John 'Neismith' (3rd great-grandson of Sir Michael) and John Baird (AKA John of Monmouth) traveled to the British colonies of North America together on the ship "Exchange of Stockton." They left Aberdeen and eventually landed in New Jersey. Both Johns were indentured to Robert Barclay. Upon the ending of their servitude, they both came into possession of 100 acres of land in Monmouth, New Jersey. John 'Nesmith' would go on to sell his land and move to South Carolina, where he would live out the rest of his life. Many of his descendants would go on to move further south into Georgia, where the Nesmiths would grow exponentially and begin to spread out and extend into other southern and some northern states.

If you think this is where the kinship ends, that is far from the truth. There are a few cemeteries near my hometown in Georgia where you can find Baird and Nesmith families buried in the same church cemeteries all the way into the early 1900s.. Since I wasn't so focused on our kinship at the time that I visited these cemeteries, I didn't look into the matter. But the next time I go back home, I will pull up the church records to see just how close these families were. Regardless, it is still great to see the names of two prominent families having stayed close to one another for centuries. And it's amazing now to finally be reunited together once again!
